ORDINANCES FOR B.A. HON'S SCHOOL COURSE

1. (a) The examination for the degree of B.A. Hon's school course shall be held in three parts to be called B.A. Hon's School course in Part-I, B.A. Hon's School course in Part-II and B.A. Hon's school course in Part-III. Each part shall consist of two semesters viz. semesters 1st and 2nd in Part-I, semesters 3rd and 4th in Part-II and semesters 5th and 6th in Part-III. The examination shall be held in the months of December and April or on such other dates as may be fixed by the Academic Council.
- (b) (i) The candidate will be required to pay examination fees as prescribed by the University from time to time.
- (ii) Last date by which the admission forms and fees for the external examination must reach the Registrar shall be as follows:

December/January	Sept. 30	October 15	October 21 (No Form will be entertained after 21st October)
April/May	February 28	March 15	March 21 (No Form will be entertained after 21st March)

2. (a) The B.A. Hon's school course in History, Political Science and English Part-I shall be open to any person who has passed the 10+2 examination of Punjab School Education

Board (with gap of not more than one year after passing) or any other examination recognised as equivalent there to by the Admission Committee with atleast 50% marks in aggregate.

(b) The B.A. Hon's school course in Punjabi Part-I shall be open to any person who has passed *10+2 examination with Punjabi.

3. Subject to fulfillment of condition in ordinances 10 and 11

(a) B.A. Hon's school course in Part-II shall be open to any person who has passed B.A. Hon's school course in part-I examination or has cleared atleast 50% of papers prescribed for the first and second semesters of B.A. Hon's school course in Part-I course.

(b) Admission to B.A. Hon's school course in Part-III shall be open to a person who has cleared all the papers of Part-I and atleast fifty percent papers of Part-II.

4 The internal assessment in each semester of B.A. Hon's school course will be 20%. Assessment shall be conveyed to the COE by the Head of the Department before the commencement of the concerned semester examination as per prescribed schedule, failing which the result of the concerned candidate will be shown as 'RL'.

5. The syllabus for the session shall be such as prescribed by the concerned Faculty from time to time.

6. Eligibility to appear in any semester examination shall be that a candidate must have his name submitted to the Registrar by the Head of the University Department/ Principal of the College and produces of having attended not less than 75% of the total number of lectures delivered in each paper and 75% of the periods held in practicals, map work, in each paper during the academic year.

* For Admission in the subject of Punjabi, there should not be gap of more than 2 years after passing 10+2 examination.

The College/Department shall be required to deliver atleast 75% of the total number of lectures prescribed for each paper.

Provided further that a deficiency in the number of Lectures or Seminars or Practicals may be condoned for special reasons as per rules made by the University from time to time.

7. The medium of examination shall be as under :

(i) The language concerned in the case of Languages.

(ii) English/Punjabi in the case of other subjects.

8 (i) A candidate is required to secure atleast 40% marks both in the external examination and aggregate of internal and external in each paper taken together in order to qualify in an examination.

(ii) (a) In the event of a candidate failing to secure the requisite 40% marks in terms of clause (i) above, he/she shall be placed under reappear in that paper (s). Such a candidate could carry the internal assessment marks secured by him for his reappear examination.

(b) However, if any candidate has secured less than 40% marks in the internal assessment in anyone or more papers and is placed under reappear in that paper(s), he/she may at his option, attend regular classes of that paper(s), after his 6th semester examination. The candidate would be required to attend such classes in a semester in which that paper(s) is offered by the department subsequently and thus improve his internal assessment score. The revised internal assessment will replace the old internal assessment. In case he fails to improve upon his earlier internal assessment in that paper(s) his original internal assessment marks would stand.

In case such a paper is dropped from the course of study as a result of any revision, the department would indicate a suitable substitute paper in lieu thereof.

Provided further that the entire B.A. Hon's school course has to be completed in a total period of six years from the date of his joining first semester.

9. The following categories of candidates shall be allowed to appear in the special paper of Punjab History and Culture in lieu of Punjabi (Compulsory) in Honours School Course:

1. Candidate who have passed their Matriculation examination from a School located outside the State of Punjab may be allowed to take up the subject of Punjab History & Culture in lieu of Punjabi Compulsory.

2. Candidate who have passed their Matriculation examination from a School located in the State of Punjab will not be allowed to take up the subject of Punjab History & Culture in lieu of Punjabi Compulsory at the graduate level. This clause will not apply to students covered by clause No. 3 given below.

3. Children of Defence personnel/Para military personnel (serving as well as retired) will be allowed to take up the subject of Punjab History & Culture, provided the father or the mother/ guardian (in case father is deceased) of the candidate gives an affidavit that the Candidate has not studied Punjabi at the School level.

10. A candidate who has passed the B.A. Hons. School Course from this University may be allowed two chance within a period of two years to appear as a private candidate for the purpose of improvement* of Division/marks. Such a candidate can appear in the maximum 50% paper of the total papers offered in the B.A. Hons School Course PROVIDED that no one who has already passed any part of M.A. examination or an examination higher than M.A. shall be allowed to improve his/her performance in B.A. Hons School Course.

* Out of papers taken up the candidates will be given benefit of increase in marks, where the marks have increased in a paper/papers.

11. A candidate who has already passed the B.A. Hons. School Course in Punjabi examination from this University or from any other statutory University in India may appear at any subsequent B.A. Hons. School Course examination in anyone or more subject(s) prescribed for the examination except the subject(s) in which he has already passed the examination. Provided that candidate be allowed to appear in the remaining papers of the discipline to fulfill the combination pattern, as per the new syllabus of Three Year Course in B.A. Hons' School in Punjabi beginning from 2000 onwards.

12. Subject to requirement of attendances and other conditions in these ordinances:

(i) there will be no condition for promotion from odd semester to even semester in an Academic Council.

(ii) for admission to 2nd year of the Course, the candidate must have passed 50% of total papers of the two semesters of the 1st year. Similarly for admission to 3rd year of the course, the candidate should have passed 50% of total papers of four semesters of the earlier two years.

(iii) a candidate placed under reappear in any paper, will be allowed two chances to clear the reappear which shall be availed within consecutive two years/chances, i.e. to pass in a paper the candidate will have a total of three chances, one as regular student and two as reappear candidate.

(iv) The Examination of reappear papers of odd semester will be held with regular examination of the odd semester and reappear examination of even semester. But if a candidate is placed under reappear in the last semester of the course, he will be provided chance to pass the reappear with the examination of the next semester, provided his reappear of lower semester does not go beyond next semester.

13. He/She shall have to qualify in all the papers prescribed for the B.A. Hon's school course within a period of six years from the date he joined the course. In case he/she failed to do so within the prescribed period of 6 years, as aforesaid, he/she shall be

declared fail. He/She may, however, seek fresh admission to the first semester on merit with the new applicants. It is understood that a reappear or failed candidates shall be allowed to take the examination held as at present or according to the date-sheet of the semester examination in which such papers may be adjusted. After completing three years of studies (i.e. six semester course) he/she shall not be admitted to any semester of the same course and will not have any privilege of a regular student.

14. The grace marks shall be allowed according to the general ordinances relating to the 'Award of Grace Marks'.
15. As soon as possible after the completion of each semester, the Registrar shall publish a list of successful candidates showing their result. Each candidate shall be supplied with a card containing his/her details of marks. The list of successful candidates on the completion of B.A. Hons' School Course in Part-III shall be arranged in three divisions and the divisions obtained by the candidate will be stated in the degree.
16. Successful candidates who obtain 60% or more of the aggregate number of marks in Part-I, Part-II and part-III examinations, taken together, shall be placed in the first division, those who obtain 50% or more but less than 60% marks shall be placed in the second division and below 50% marks shall be placed in third division, successful candidates who obtain 75% or more marks in the aggregate will be placed in the First Division with 'Distinction'.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PAPER-SETTER

1. There shall be six questions in all. Question 1 and 2 are compulsory. Out of the remaining four questions, the candidate shall attempt any three. Each question shall be of 16 marks.
2. Question No.1 shall comprise phonemic transcription of common English words using IPA symbols. The candidate shall also mark primary stress wherever required. There shall be 25 words in this question out of which the candidates shall attempt any 16. Each word shall carry 1 mark.
3. Question No.2 shall comprise words in Minimal Pairs. There shall be 10 pairs of words in this question out of which the candidate shall point out the phonemic differences of any eight. Each minimal pair shall be of 2 marks.
4. Question Nos. 3,4 and 5 shall be of theoretical nature based on the chapters of the prescribed text. Each of these three questions shall have its internal alternative also.
5. Question No.6 shall be an objective-type one based on exercises given at the end of the prescribed chapters from the book *A Course In Phonetics and Spoken English*. The question shall comprise fill-ups, true-false statements, short definitions/notes and comparisons/differences etc. The paper-setter shall set six sentences in each of the above-mentioned four sub-categories out of which the candidate shall attempt four each.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PAPER-SETTER

1. The Question paper should carry 100 marks and the time allowed would be three hours.
2. The question paper should contain ten essay type questions. It should be divided into two sections. Five questions should be set from each section. The candidates should be asked to attempt five questions, selecting at least two questions from each section. All questions carry equal marks.
3. The question should be set strictly according to the syllabus.
4. The language of questions should be straight and simple.
5. Not more than one question should be based on quotation.
6. The question paper should cover the whole syllabus and questions should be evenly distributed.
7. Those questions which have more than one part, marks for each part must be indicated on the question paper itself.

PAPER-VI : BRITISH HISTORY

Time : 3 Hours

Max. Marks : 80

Pass Marks : 40%

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PAPER-SETTER

1. The syllabus-prescribed should be strictly adhered to. The paper-setters should keep in view the topics specified in each paper and not the title of the paper.
2. The question paper will consist of five sections : A, B, C, D and E. Sections A, B, C and D will have two questions from the respective sections of the syllabus and will carry 15 marks each, Section E will consist of 10 short answer type questions which will cover the entire syllabus and will carry 20 marks in all. There being no internal choice in this section, each short answer type question will carry 2 marks. Candidates are required to attempt one question each from the sections A, B, C and D and the entire section E.

3. If there is a question on notes, the choice offered in such a question should at least be fifty percent.
4. The wording of the questions should be simple and easily understandable by an average student. There should be no vagueness.
5. The number of questions based upon quotations should not exceed two in a question paper.
6. The general standard of the questions should cater to the different intellectual level average, above average and below average.
7. Each paper is of 80 marks and of three hours duration and 20 marks of internal assessment.
